ver 100 student nurses, robed in classic nursing attire, attended the International Nurses Day celebrations hosted at the University of Namibia Main Campus, early last month.

Speaking at the ceremony, Senior Lecturer at the University of Namibia School of Nursing: Department of General Nursing Science, Prof Lischen Hoases-Gorases, expressed her belief in the nursing student's abilities in what she described as a "remarkable" profession. At the same time, however, she also warned them against the hurdles that lie ahead.

The event, which was co-hosted by the International University of Management (IUM) Faculty of Health Sciences, ran by the theme: "Nurses a voice to lead - Health is a human right" and attracted dignitaries from significant sectors of Namibia,



including representatives from the Ministry of Health and Social Services.

"Nurses are the backbone of the health sector," said Prof Hoases-Gorases, who also stressed that a nurse's importance was at par with that of medical doctors.

"There will be times in future when you will get demotivated, but remember that motivation is critical because the patients are dependent on you," she added.



First year Nursing student Magritta Hashipala described the event as "informative and phenomenal." "It is a day to create awareness not only in areas where we are not performing well, but also where we have reached great achievements, and reminding ourselves why we chose this path."

International Nurses Day is a world event celebrated on 12 May every year in recognition of the efforts of nurses the world over.

Environmental Sciences with a Forestry Specialisation, as well as the BSc Degree in Crop Science.


